Examining Graphics and Formatting

skimmers look at graphics, charts, tables, and other visual elements to quickly gather information. Captions and labels can offer insights into the content.



Reviewing the Introduction and Conclusion

skimmers may read the introduction and conclusion paragraphs to grasp the main idea and summary of the content. These sections often provide an overview of what the text is about.



Focus on Headings and Subheadings

skimmers pay close attention to headings, subheadings, and any emphasized or bolded text. These elements often provide clues about the main topics and structure of the text.



Ignoring Details

unlike more in-depth reading strategies, skimming involves ignoring details and focusing on the broader themes and concepts.



Reading the First and Last Sentences of Paragraphs

skimming involves reading the initial
and concluding sentences of
paragraphs to capture the main
points and transitions.



Reading Speed

skimming involves reading at a much faster pace than usual. It's about moving your eyes quickly across the text, covering a large portion of it in a short amount of time.



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
