

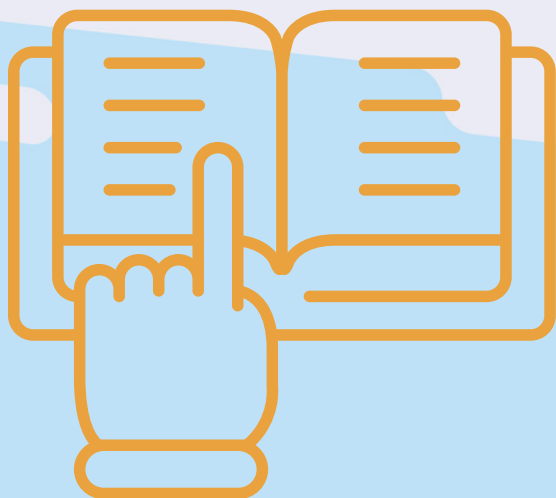
Explain what the scanning strategy is
